

## **UNESCO World Heritage Site**

In the 17th and 18th centuries, the Danish kings practiced par force hunting. It's a violent form of hunting that requires plenty of forest, roads, and deer. In 1669, Christian V was given a small area in the Deer Park for parforce hunting. The following year, when he ascended to power, the entire deer park and forest were combined into a single parforce hunting ground.

Many of the forest roads in Deer Park and Forest were originally old hunting paths, and the deer are descendants from the time of par force hunting. The beautiful Eremitage Palace was built as a hunting lodge in 1734-36 for the king's banquets during the par force hunts.

In 2015. Deer Park and Forest along with Gribskov and Store Dyrehave, were designated as UNESCO World Heritage Sites. These unique cultural landscapes constitute parforce hunting grounds in North Zealand. The landscape tells the story of the immense power of the Danish kings and their great need to demonstrate it to the people and other rulers.

Worth experiencing

- **Bøllemosen** is a habitat for many different animals and plants. Enjoy a quiet moment on the boardwalk across the bog, or go exploring around the bog.
- 2 Skodsborg Station House is a magnificent protected building from 1897. The station is starting point for several marked trails
- **Skodsborg Pond** is a beautiful old carp pond from the time of Frederik VII. Today, you can fish for roaches and carp there.
- **Barrows**, especially from the Bronze Age, are found everywhere in the area. You can see many barrows along Kristiansholmsvej.
- In the new part of Jægersborg Deer Park, you may notice how the large deer species relocated from the old deer park are transforming the old production forest into an open woodland, creating space for various plants and small animals.
- **Raadvad** is one of the earliest industrial towns in Denmark. The hydro power from Mølleåen has been utilized since the 1600s, and today, there is a tavern, a hostel, and a knowledge center for building preservation.
- **The Mølleåen stream.** The river is 36 km long and takes its rise from Bastrup Lake. You can navigate by canoe to the campsite at Strandmøllen.
- R Hvidtjørnesletten and Christian V's oak where Christian V was kicked by a wounded red deer during a par force hunt in 1698.
- **Eremitageslottet** was the center for the king's hunts. Christian VI built the castle, and today, the Danish royal family uses it for official purposes.
- The Ulvedal Oak is one of the oldest oak trees in the park, and it is over 600 years old.
- **Dyrehavsbakken** is the world's oldest existing amusement park. It originated in 1583 as a marketplace at the Spring of Kirstens Pil. See details at bakken.dk.
- **Klampenborg Gate** is a an example of the iconic red gates that mark the entrance to the Deer Park. The gates look today as they have done since the late 1700s.

## **Welcome to Jægersborg Deer** Park and Jægersborg Forest

The Deer Park is the most popular nature reserve in Denmark. It was extended north to Skodsborgvej in 2024. The area is home to a large amount of endangered species due to its varied nature. In Jægersborg Forest north of Skodsborgvej, you will find a nature playground, fitness trail, campfire sites, and picnic areas.

Area: Roughly 1.700 hectares. It measures 8 km from north to south.

**Nature:** The Deer Park is known for its ancient oak trees and hawthorns. Bøllemosen in Jægersborg Forest is located in the highstemmed deciduous forest of Jægersborg Hegn.

Wildlife:: The Deer Park is home to approximately 2100 deer. including red deer, fallow deer, sika deer, and roe deer. You might be lucky to see large birds and various birds of prey.



The S-train, line C, runs to Klampenborg station.

Kystbanen (the coast line train) stops at Klampenborg and Skodsborg Stations. See more at rejseplanen.dk.
